Kitsap County Parks Adaptive Recreation & Accessibility Activities

Kitsap County Parks Department is working to create a web page dedicated to accessible and adaptive recreation for Kitsap County parks and trails.

- Chico Salmon Park: 100-yard path to viewing area of the stream. Playground chips and 1-2% grade. Best location in the county to view salmon the last week of October through mid-November
- 2. <u>Harper Park</u>: short grade of 8% followed by 0% grade to a viewing area with educational signs .4 miles long out and back. Recent improvements to the bridge make this a great location for wheeled access. Compacted gravel.
- Howe Farm Park: .4 miles of compacted gravel with +/- 5% grade to a pond with views of the historic barn. Surface needs improvement. Scheduled for fall of 2024. Great spot for bird watching.
- 4. <u>Illahee Preserve Heritage Park</u>: Short compacted gravel loop trail of .4 miles through the woods. Easy access from the parking area. Trail is built but needs final topcoat of compacted gravel. Should be completed fall of 2024.
- 5. <u>Point No Point Lighthouse & Park</u>: Out and back compacted gravel trail of .4 miles that provides views of Puget Sound and Mt. Rainier on clear days. Parking lot access TBD depending on erosion work/damage.
- 6. North Kitsap Heritage Park: .2 miles of 0% grade compacted gravel to a beaver pond, short and sweet.
- 7. South Kitsap Regional Park: 0 grade compacted gravel 1.3 miles of trail adjacent to roadways. Recently added in 2023/24 is an additional .65-mile section with very slight grade (3%) that provides a woodsier experience. The final steps are in play to make this a complete loop. An additional .1 mile of trail needs to go in to complete the loop.
